Character Trait of the Month

Harmony

Harmony: Living at peace with others

One of the things I appreciate about the Bible is that God chose real, imperfect people as his servants. In Genesis 27:19, Jacob tricked his father, Isaac, into blessing him, instead of his firstborn brother, Esau. Isaac was blind so he couldn't see that Jacob was an imposter. Jacob said to his father, "I am Esau your firstborn. I have done as you told me. Please sit up and eat some of my game, so that you may give me your blessing."

Receiving Isaac's blessing meant that Jacob would be the leader of the family and become next in the line of the patriarchs. When Esau realized that Jacob had stolen his blessing, the Bible says he was furious and made plans for revenge. Imagine if one of your classmates stole your project and turned it in for your good grade or cheated off your test and you received a zero.

A simple definition of humility is: living at peace with others. Obviously, Jacob wasn't thinking of others when he stole Esau's blessing, and his brother hated him for it. It would be twenty years before they resolved their conflict.

When working around others, disputes may arise. As Christians, it's important to try to restore unity as quickly as possible. This month, we've been talking in class about the following five steps for resolving conflict. These can help restore a sense of peace at school, and will be helpful throughout your life.

The Five A's for Resolving Conflict

Choices have consequences. When we make a choice that causes conflict, we can resolve it peacefully by following the Five A's (from *The Young Peacemaker*, by Corlette Sande):

1. Admit what I did wrong. This means you take responsibility for your choices, as well as the sinful roots of these choices. The Bible calls this confession.
2. Apologize for how my choice affected the other person, and for hurting him or her.
3. Accept the consequences. When you do this without arguing, you demonstrate that your repentance is genuine.
4. Ask for forgiveness from God and the other person.
5. Alter (change) my choice in the future. Tell the other person how you want to change and pray that God will give you the heart and the will to do so.

Above all, pray for those who persecute you (Matthew 5:44). Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called sons of God (Matthew 5:9).

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

But he never walked away from someone living in sin without confronting their sinful lifestyle. In fact, I can't think of a single incidence in the Bible in which Jesus showed an ounce of tolerance, only and always, love.

We know that loving someone doesn't equal agreeing with everything they do. If that were true, disciplining our children would never be necessary. We don't tolerate their bad behavior because we know it will only encourage more of it. We want our children to obey God's word because obedience results in blessing. As John Ried, a Christian blogger states, "Tolerance flies in the face of the gospel because it is apathetic both to brokenness and holiness." Why is this dangerous? Because when we don't recognize our brokenness (sin-filled life) we will never recognize our need for holiness, a relationship with a loving God who can free us of our sin. Jesus was the epitome of love, but He was completely intolerant towards sin. So much so that he died for our sins.

Teach your children to love others, to pray for those that hate them or are unkind to them, and to turn the other cheek when they've been wronged. This is biblical. But don't teach them to be tolerant and to ignore sin or sinful behavior because they feel they will be persecuted. Remind them instead that we are called to live a life that is pleasing to God and that we will be "hated" because of it. Remind them that those who are humble here, those who are persecuted here, will be great in heaven. This is our reward, not our relevance here on earth. John 3:16 says, "For God so LOVED the world he gave his only begotten son.." to die on the cross for our sins. That's not an act of tolerance, that's an act of extreme love.



Legacy Student Sings at Festival



"It is an opportunity to experience God outside of your normal morning routine," said 9th grader Jonathan Spangler-Skata.


"Pronouncements is boot camp for spiritual
