What are you enjoying about your college experience? My favorite aspects of college life are meeting new people and having free access to resources that I wouldn't otherwise have. How do you feel your time at Legacy helped prepare you for college? Legacy definitely helped me prepare academically for college by following a university schedule and introducing me to rigorous courses early on. But as I have spent more time in college, I think the most valuable lesson I have learned from my time at Legacy is confidence in myself and my faith. The small classes allowed me to really get to know my teachers and gave me confidence in my studies. Leadership courses at Legacy taught me how to defend my faith and encouraged me to read God's Word every day. Without Legacy, I know it would have been a much more difficult transition from high school to college.

How was your adjustment to the college schedule based on coming from a university-model school? Adjusting to the college schedule was easy coming from Legacy. I think most students coming out of high school are used to being in class all day, so when they have "free time" in college, they typically don't know how to manage their time. The university-model school schedule provides for an easier transition because students learn time management skills while still in high school.

What are some of your fond memories/favorite experiences while at Legacy? One of my favorite memories at Legacy was participating in National Honor Society. Our organization hosted a drive for items to go in care packages for American troops stationed in Africa. It was great to see so many students come together for a great cause; we shipped almost 50 packages!

If you had to describe Legacy in one or two sentences to somebody, what would you say? The students at Legacy do not only benefit from the academic rigor of honors-level classes; they are also strengthened in their walk with Jesus. Students leave Legacy confident in their faith and ready to tackle the challenges of university academics.

How does your spiritual life play a role in your college experience? Most students and faculty in my area of study are not believers and do not condone Theism. As a result, my faith is challenged now more than ever. Luckily, I have plugged into a great church and I have been part of a Christian organization on campus. I have found that keeping close Christian friends has been imperative in my walk with the Lord as I go through my college experience.
