

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Spiritual Discipline Serving

As we continue our study of the book, Spiritual Disciplines for the Christian Life, by Donald S. Whitney, we have moved from Worship, to Silence & Solitude, and now to Serving. Here we are learning that true Christ followers are compelled to no longer live for themselves, but for Christ. There are six motivations for Serving the author wishes for us to focus on as we discipline ourselves for the purpose of godliness.

Obedience - "You shall walk after the Lord your God and fear Him and keep His commandments and obey His voice, and you shall serve Him and hold fast to Him." Deuteronomy 13:4

Gratitude - "Only fear the Lord and serve Him faithfully with all your heart. For consider what great things He has done for you." I Samuel 12:24 Gladness - "Serve the Lord with gladness" Psalm 100:2

Forgiveness - "One of the seraphim flew to me, having in his hand a burning coal that he had taken with tongs from the altar. And he touched my mouth and said: 'Behold, this has touched your lips; your guilt is taken away, and your sin atoned for.' And I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' then I said, 'Here I am! Send me.' Isaiah 6:6-8 (sound familiar?)

Humility - "When He had washed their feet and put on His outer garments and resumed His place, He said to them, 'Do you understand what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord, and you are right, for so I am. If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that you also should do just as I have done to you. Truly, truly, I say to you, a servant is not greater than his master, nor is a messenger greater than the one who sent him'." John 13:12-16

Love - "For you were called to freedom, brothers. Only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another." Galatians 5:13

Serving is the pouring out of an overflowing heart. Spurgeon surmised it so beautifully, "The heir of heaven serves his Lord simply out of gratitude; he has no salvation to gain, no heaven to lose;...now, out of love to the God who chose him, and who gave so great a price for his redemption, he desires to lay out himself entirely to his Master's service.... The child of God works not for life, but from life; he does not work to be saved, he works because he is saved. "Serving will rarely be glorious on this earth. Mr. James served us with a joyful heart by keeping our lunchroom tidy. He loved His God and so he served us in God's name. We were only a small part of Mr. James' life story, just one tiny fragment of the many he blessed during his lifetime. He now stands before his Heavenly Father being told, 'Well done, my good and faithful servant'.

Perhaps in heaven Serving turns out to be glorious after all.





Legacy's Robots

The Legacy Programming and Engineering class has recently been building and programming robots using simple parts for complex actions. Legacy's robotics began about three years ago, when teacher Amy Brown formed the program in order to teach high school students how to design, construct, and program robots. They used LEGO MINDSTORM EV3 hardware and ROBOTC (C# based language) programming software in order to control their robots they had built themselves. The students work through team-based challenges, focusing on robotics hardware and underlying technologies, explicit math and science concepts, and the Engineering Process. Occasionally they have in-class team competitions involving building and programming robots with motors and sensors to autonomously interact with their environment while navigating through obstacle courses or in robot-on-robot battles. Freshman, Conner Wilson, says, "This class is a fun way to learn about robots and how they work."

In the fall of this school year, Legacy had its first robotics team go to an outside competition. On January 18th, Legacy's inaugural robotics teams won 1st place at the TCEA Advanced Arena competition at Trinity High School for Area 6 (picture attached). Before spring break, competition team members, Matthew Dick and Caleb Goza, finished redesigning and building a new robotic arm to earn even more points at the TCEA State Competition on April 15th, when, unfortunately, the event was canceled due to COVID 19 concerns. The Legacy robotics team will just remain undefeated this year!


Looking ahead, there are some exciting changes happening next school year for Legacy robotics. First, Legacy Prep was recently awarded grant money from FIRST in Texas and Texas Workforce Commission to start a FIRST Tech Challenge robotics program (attached picture) with two high school teams in the 2020-2021 school year. This will allow Legacy high school students to participate in a robust, advanced robotics program and compete with public and private schools across the state. Legacy will also repurpose the current high school LEGO EV3 robotics kits to be used in a middle school computer elective class to create a new middle school robotics program for 2020-2021. The future awaits within the ever growing Legacy Robotics program.
